MTC Purchases Downtown Building

Marion Technical College marked a major milestone on July 17, 2025 with the official opening of a newly acquired facility in downtown Marion that will serve as a hub for workforce development, entrepreneurship, and advanced education. Before the purchase, Marion Tech had rented space in this facility since 2020.

The facility, located in the heart of downtown Marion at 107 N. Main Street, will house a variety of forward-thinking spaces, including:

- Additive manufacturing labs for workforce training and prototyping by students, small businesses, and entrepreneurs
- Flexible academic classrooms designed to support learners of all ages
- Updated training space for the Ohio Peace Officer Training Academy
- Modern office areas are intended to foster entrepreneurial collaboration and community partnerships

"This building is more than brick and mortar—it's a promise," McCall said. "A promise that Marion Technical College will continue to grow, adapt, and lead. A promise that downtown Marion will thrive as a hub of innovation and opportunity."

The acquisition of the facility was made possible through the support of the federal government and local entrepreneur Lois Fisher.



RN Nursing Alumni Legacy Scholarship

When the Marion Technical College nursing class of 2024 graduated in December, they did more than just celebrate. They created a \$500

scholarship to help a future second year student in the Registered Nurse program with financial need make it to graduation.

"We are really excited about this. Half of us are older than 27 and many of us have kids. We know what it means to go back to school—how hard it is to finance school and take time off work. Some of our classmates worked night shift then came to class. We want to make it easier for someone else in that situation," said Michelle Little, the nursing class president. "Nursing school changed our lives. If we can give that opportunity to someone else, we want to do it."

With this scholarship in mind, the class worked together on a variety of fundraisers for the pinning ceremony.

"We fundraised really hard to get enough to make the donation," Little said. "We wanted to pay it forward. The best part is the current graduating class has continued with this tradition and donated to the scholarship fund as well."

"The scholarship was a class effort. We were very tight-knit group. We are so proud of each other. Nursing school is very demanding and all our classmates worked exceptionally hard," Little said.



The Rick Lyon Scholarship

After a lifetime of hard work, a couple from Caledonia is investing in local college students in need. Rick and Terry Lyon created a new scholarship fund at Marion Technical College. As a child and teen growing up in Marion, Rick loved tinkering with technology.

"As a kid, I was always into electronics. I once dragged a broken TV home in my little red wagon to try to fix it," Rick recalls.

Rick had no plans of going to college, but when he found out that Marion Tech had an electrical engineering program, he reconsidered. That decision changed Rick's life. He graduated from Marion Tech in 1981 with an associate's degree in electrical engineering. Rick started working at Fairfield Engineering and then went to the local phone company, formerly GTE, where several of the faculty members also worked. He used GTE's tuition assistance to continue his education.

Rick earned his bachelor's degree from Franklin University and eventually a master's in business administration from Ashland University. He also went from an entry-level engineering associate to Director of Engineering and Construction in Ohio for Frontier by the time he retired.

"I was always in engineering," Rick recalls. "There are very few people who made it from an associate to a director and never left their hometown. I was very fortunate."

Rick also met his wife, Terry, who grew up on a dairy farm in Pennsylvania. In Marion, Terry spent decades working for the post office. After retiring, Rick continued using his skills as a part-owner of Marion Brewing Company. "Marion invested in Rick Lyon and now he's investing in other students," said Mike Stuckey, director of the Marion Technical College Foundation. "Our growing student body depends on people like Rick and Terry who want to help give them a hand up."

Breaking Barriers with Two New Initiatives: MCF Promise Program and United Way Community Impact Grant

The COVID-19 pandemic disproportionately impacted the educational pathways of Marion County's 2020-2023 high school graduates as compared to high school graduates before and after these years. The new Marion Community Foundation Promise Program initiative directly addresses the urgent need to re-engage these young adults in higher education, providing them with a tuition-free pathway at MTC. Eligible students will begin courses tuition-free this spring at Marion Tech. This last-dollar scholarship program is intended to cover tuition if other federal and state programs do not cover the entire cost of tuition for Spring 2026 classes.

The United Way has also pledged support for MTC students through a grant that supports removing transportation barriers for our students. Marion Technical College has made it a priority to remove non-academic barriers for our students. This grant adds additional funding to the MTC Student Emergency Fund, which allows us to disperse additional assistance to our students outside of other aid, for which they may be eligible but does not address these issues.



NSF Grant to Boost Cybersecurity Training

Marion Technical College is proud to announce an ambitious initiative to expand cybersecurity education and train more workers in response to the pressing need for cybersecurity expertise in today's digital landscape. This new National Science Foundation grant will help bridge the skills gap and establish a skilled cybersecurity workforce to meet local, regional, and nationwide demands.

This initiative aims to increase program enrollment among underrepresented students in cybersecurity, including rural students, economically disadvantaged individuals, and women by 25%.

Investiture of Dr. Ryan McCall

A surprise recognition of Dr. McCall's investiture as Marion Technical College's fourth president was held in conjunction with the 2025 Alumni Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony. Dr. McCall was presented with a presidential medallion featuring the official college seal on the front and a custom engraving on the back recognizing his commencement as president on December 15, 2015. The design also featured four inset sapphire stones representing his service as the college's fourth president.
