Marion Tech Graduates 415, Including First BSN Program Students

Marion Technical College celebrated 415 graduates during the college's fifty-second annual commencement at the Marion Palace Theatre on May 10. Together, they earned more than 500 degrees and certificates. These included the first two graduates of the new bachelor of science in nursing program.

Graduates ranged in age from 16 to 72 and came from 27 Ohio counties. They included five veterans and 22 high school students who earned associate degrees at no cost to them or their families through the College Credit Plus Program.



The Pursue Your Dream Scholarship

Marion natives Steve and Brenda Johnston have created a scholarship for adult students who find their direction a little later in life. The new Pursue Your Dream Scholarship will support students ages 25 and older attending Marion Tech. "We have always believed in working hard. Since the Marion community has been good to us, we wanted to support people who want to make their lives and our community a better place to live," said Steve Johnston. "We wanted to create a scholarship for those who need a little extra time to decide what direction in life they want to pursue."

Steve and Brenda Johnston both graduated from Harding High School in 1977 and went straight to work. They reconnected at a high school reunion a decade later, fell in love and married.

Steve's grandfather, Lloyd Johnston, founded Johnston Supply, a plumbing and HVAC supply company. When Steve's father, Peck Johnston, died in 2006, Steve became the CEO of the family business. In 2007, he asked Brenda to work temporarily in payroll. That temporary job lasted for more than 17 years.

"We focused on supporting our employees. The retention and longevity of the staff showed that investment," Steve said. Now that they have retired from that business, they are investing in Marion the way they invested in their employees.

Steve is also continuing his father's tradition in many ways. His father, Peck Johnston, was a founding member of the Marion Tech Foundation Board. Steve also served on the college's Board of Trustees. The Johnstons are also involved with Downtown Marion Inc. and many other community groups. Brenda is former president of the Pleasant Local Schools Parent-Teacher Organization. "Marion's home. We've been fortunate. We really enjoy giving back," Steve said.



The David and Jane Fogle Scholarship

Local farmer, businessman and philanthropist Kit Fogle and his family have established the The David and Jane Fogle Scholarship Fund to support students pursuing their educational aspirations at Marion Technical College. This scholarship will be awarded to graduates of Upper Sandusky High School with financial need and good academic standing.

"I wanted to do this in my parents' honor," said Kit. "Marion Tech is one of the best assets of this community. Every business or neighbor has a connection to Marion Tech."

Fogle knows the value of Marion Tech. He is serving as the Chair of the Marion Tech Board of Trustees. He has been a member of the board for five years.

David and Jane Fogle farmed all of their lives. They raised their four children on the farm located in the tri-county area of Marion, Hardin and Wyandot counties. Kit and his sisters caught the bus to Upper Sandusky schools at 6:40 a.m. The Fogles did not attend college, but they made it a priority for their children.

"They encouraged and supported education all the time. I was thinking

I would farm after graduating from high school, but they insisted I go to college," Kit said.

That decision changed Fogle's life and opened doors for different lines of work. As a first-generation college student, Fogle worked through college and appreciated scholarships. He now serves as Senior Vice President of investments for Stifel Investments and is a Certified Plan Fiduciary Advisor (CPFA).

Fogle and his wife, Lori, also continue to operate the family farm. They ensured that their daughters Abigail and Alexis graduated from college. Abigail's husband, Tyler Spears, is currently attending Marion Tech to study Information Technology and Cybersecurity.

The Fogle family's new scholarship fund will help others pursuing a college education. "I hope it allows people to further their education, get a better-paying job, stay in the community and give back," Fogle said. "It's the American Dream."



The Kristian Jay Moore Scholarship

A new scholarship at Marion Technical College honors Kristian Jay Moore, a man who loved learning. Kris did not let Dandy-Walker Syndrome, a congenital brain malformation, slow him down. He graduated from Worthington Kilbourne High School in 1995. He then worked at ARC Industries in Columbus, where he received several awards for outstanding employee. Kris also won medals for swimming, bowling and track in the Special Olympics.

While Kris was growing up, Al was serving thousands of students at Marion Technical College as Dean and Professor of General Education. After Al retired, the Moore family moved to Utah. Sadly, Kris died in 2020. In his memory, the Moore family and their long-time friends, the Foxes, created the new Kristian Jay Moore Scholarship which will help more women enter engineering.

"Kris loved to see people overcome any obstacles. Kris was the ultimate optimist. Supporting those who are optimistic about their future is something Kris would enjoy," Al said. "Kris made the world a better place and now he will support women striving to make the world a better place through advancements in engineering."

Pat and Mike Fox also wanted to honor Kris. "Mike and I were always inspired by the love, support, and attention Al and JoAnne gave to all their children," Pat Fox says. "The best way I can describe Kris is 'joy.' He found joy in the smallest of things."

Pat Fox taught as a business faculty member for more than 30 years. Her husband, Mike, worked at GTE and Verizon for 40 years as an equipment installer. He also served on the Marion Tech advisory committee when the new telecommunications program was started.

"The decision to set up a scholarship in Kris's memory was an easy one," Fox says. "Marion Tech has services available to help all students succeed. As a faculty member, I saw students succeed against all odds."

National Science Foundation Cybersecurity Grant

Marion Technical College is proud to announce an ambitious initiative to expand cybersecurity education and train more workers in response to the pressing need for cybersecurity expertise in today's digital landscape. This new National Science Foundation grant will help bridge the skills gap and establish a skilled cybersecurity workforce to meet local, regional, and nationwide demands.

Marion Tech was awarded \$533,404 to better align curriculum with the NSA Center of Excellence in Cybersecurity. In addition to upgrading hardware, Marion Tech will offer cybersecurity camps starting in the summer of 2025 to provide free training to teachers, government employees and utility workers as well as students. The college will develop three new cybersecurity courses and certifications that include stackable certificate options where students can tailor learning to their career goals and put their education to use in their careers quickly.

This initiative aims to increase program enrollment among underrepresented students in cybersecurity, including rural students, economically disadvantaged individuals, and women by 25%.
